Cultural heritages have been passed down from the past, but they are constantly redefined and recreated by the members of the communities. Their meanings and functions change reflecting the socio-cultural conditions of the present day. This requires the safeguarding plans for ICH to adapt to the changes accordingly. Although communities cannot answer all the needs and challenges, any discussion should be made with the views and needs of the communities incorporated.
